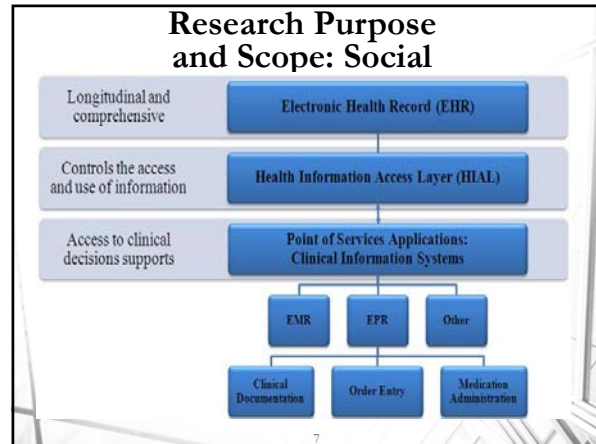

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## Research Purpose and Scope: Social


Understanding local perspectives of registered nurses – this new knowledge may help us to determine why electronic health record (EHR) challenges exist. That is, to help us understand why some projects fail while others succeed.



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## Research Purpose and Scope: Practical

- The essence of understanding new health-care technologies and end-user responses.
  - Patient safety
  - Efficiency
  - Prevailing practices

Data Collection


- Stage One: Focus groups
  - 12 participants
- Stage Two: Unstructured Interviews
  - 9 participants
